REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Tom Bowdidge Youth Cancer Foundation operates under a governing document which was agreed by the trustees and is dated the 28th of February 2014.

The board of trustees is made up from individuals who have suitable experience from within the charitable sector and in business that the founders feel will benefit the future success of The Foundation. Sadly Tomas Carruthers, one of our first Trustees, tendered is resignation for health reasons. It was sadly accepted and Richard, Nikki and the rest of the Board wish him well for the future. A new Trustee will be appointed as soon as a suitable candidate is available.

The trustees meet every three months to review the financial position of The Foundation and to consider the funding of projects which meet the criteria set out in our founding aims and objectives. In addition the trustees are responsible for approving expenditure to support The Foundation's fundraising activities.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The principle objects of The Tom Bowdidge Youth Cancer Foundation are to promote the relief, care, well-being and rehabilitation of teenagers and young people suffering from cancer, and their families. To carry out research and publish any useful results into the causes and effects of cancer in teenagers and young people.

SUMMARY OF THE MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS DURING THE YEAR

The highlight of the year was that at the 2020 Feather Ball we were able to celebrate that we had raised our first

£1million!

This is an incredible achievement and is testament to the dedication and determination of our supporters, Trustees, and donors.

We hope Tom is proud.

During the year, The Foundation continued to follow the principles laid down by Tom in supporting Teenagers and Young Adults with cancer.

We have directly supported young people and their families through the provision of care grants to support them financially. We know these can make a huge difference to the family covering travel costs and also providing laptops, tablets, and mobile phones, often used to continue studies and to stay in touch with friends. We know mental health wellbeing is a major benefit of the support we give.

Fundraising Activities

Once again, we had a packed year of fundraising activities. Our supporters and fundraisers have taken part in some incredible challenges but also have also simply volunteered at buckets collections or helped on our stand at the many events The Foundation has attended.

- The Golf Day was a record with 26 teams participating and raising over £8,500
- Andy Brown daringly made a wing walk and raised over £1,200 his cheque was donated at a lovely late Summer Tea party which in itself raised over £2,000
- We were selected to be the Colchester Rotary Forum Club President's charity. They held a wonderful choir competition for local schools and the collections raised well over £1,000
- Fraser Lewis dedicated himself to running 19 marathons in 2019! No mean feat at all!
- Christmas is always a busy time for The Foundation's fundraising efforts. A number of Christmas Fairs were attended where the Christmas stock was sold. Once again, a successful year resulting in £8,000 of profit.

We need to draw on the skills of each and every member of the board as we approach the challenges of the new financial year and the new world we will be living in for the coming months if not years.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

As mentioned above, the year of events always ends with our signature fundraising event, The Feather Ball. Every year the ball has a theme and in 2020 it was Musical Theatre, and the Ball had a new home; Braxted Park. Nearly 300 guests enjoyed the silent auction, raffle, casino and four course dinner, raising £57,000 for the Foundation.

Corporate Support

One of the main targets Trustees have set The Foundation and themselves is to enhance and increase the level corporate support it receives.

Corporate support can have a huge impact on the funds we have available and when a company engages with The Foundation, they can know that they are making a huge difference and potentially have more impact on The Foundation than they would on a larger charity.

Many corporate supporters and their staff are keen to know that their fundraising efforts make a difference. As a result, The Board of Trustees set up a committee to identify potential corporate partners.

During the year The Foundation has benefitted from a number of partnerships;

- In 2017 Nathanael Lee, who The Foundation had previously supported in his endeavours to raise money to fund
 his life saving treatment, put us forward to be his employer, SCOR's first ever charity partner. The Foundation
 was successful in winning the staff vote against a number of national charities. This was a huge boost and a
 partnership both of us are excited about.
- Rund Partnership continues to provide regular donations.
- Lanswood Developments was kind enough to sponsor the Feather Ball which helped us to achieve our best ever fundraising results for the ball.
- Total Paint Solutions and Northcott Global Solutions, as ever, supported the Golf Day.
- Beresfords Estate Agents provided sponsorship to enable The Foundation to have promotional boards up to promote the Christmas Fayre.
- FSCOM supported the Cheese & Wine Evening in the Summer of 2019.

Hospital Funding

One area the Foundation has always been excited about is the development of age-appropriate facilities in local hospitals. The latest project is the Teenage and Young Adult space in the Collingwood Cancer Centre in Colchester Hospital. This is just an amazing space with privacy screens, TVs, and game stations; exactly what we had hoped for.

This brings The Foundation's investment into the age-appropriate facilities here to well over £100,000!

Institute of Cancer Research Project

We have continued our funding with the ICR. I would like to extend my thanks to the Trustees for agreeing to continue to fund the project led by Professor Janet Shipley into sarcoma research for the next three years. We are anticipating that the investment in this project will start to show exciting developments within the next two years.

Summary

As we came to the end of the year, the Coronavirus Pandemic was beginning to take hold and the UK had entered Lockdown. Looking forward, every fundraising event in the calendar was cancelled, having a huge impact on our ability to secure funding. We are very happy and relieved to say that SCOR immediately stepped up and advanced The Foundation an incredible donation of £30,000 to support us during the upcoming challenging times we faced.
