# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2021

### GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Tom Bowdidge Youth Cancer Foundation operates under a governing document which was agreed by the trustees and is dated the 28th of February 2014.

The Board of Trustees is made up from individuals who have suitable experience from within the charitable sector and in business that the founders feel will benefit the future success of The Foundation.

The Trustees meet every three months to review the financial position of The Foundation and to consider the funding of projects which meet the criteria set out in our founding aims and objectives. In addition, the Trustees are responsible for approving expenditure to support The Foundation's fundraising activities.

### AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

The principal objects of The Tom Bowdidge Youth Cancer Foundation are to promote the relief, care, well-being and rehabilitation of teenagers and young people suffering from cancer, and their families. To carry out research and publish any useful results into the causes and effects of cancer in teenagers and young people.

### SUMMARY OF THE MAIN ACHIEVEMENTS DURING THE YEAR

During the year, The Foundation continued to follow the principles laid down by Tom in supporting Teenagers and Young Adults with cancer.

The onset of the Coronavirus Pandemic, unprecedented in modern life caused a tsunami of challenges for both the Foundation but more directly, to the young people we support. At one point applications had increased by over 1,300%.

During the year we;

- Provided over £72,000 in care and support grants to over 170 young people directly
- Continued to fund our life saving treatment research project with a further £60,000 of investment.

We have directly supported young people and their families through the provision of care grants to support them. We know these can make a huge difference to the family covering travel costs or providing hotel accommodation for them to be able to stay near their child when they are in hospital because Covid meant they could not stay on the ward with them. Through purchasing laptops, tablets, and mobile phones, used to continue studies and to stay in touch with friends, and also in providing end of life support so they can live life to the full during palliative care.

We know mental health wellbeing is a major benefit of the support we give, and we are told that the support we give makes a huge difference to the lives of these young people, especially as they try to maintain their social and academic connections with friends, family and school.

### **Fundraising Activities**

I would very much like to have been writing a report that summarised all the incredible fundraising activities we carried out and what an amazing year we had had. Sadly, the Coronavirus Pandemic put paid to that!

From the beginning of Lockdown every planned fundraising activity came to an abrupt halt and therefore nearly every penny of revenue dried up and therefore, as a Board of Trustees, we needed to act quickly to protect the Foundation and to ensure the Foundation could still meet its funding commitments. The decision was made to take advantage of the Government Furlough Scheme and therefore the CEO and the Part-Time Office Assistant were placed on Furlough with immediate effect.

During this time the Foundation was able to submit a number of applications to receive Covid-19 Emergency Grant Funding from several sources. To this end the Foundation received funding from;

The National Lottery Community Fund - £10,000

The Charities Aid Foundation Coronavirus Emergency Fund - £5,000

The Moondance Foundation - £5,000

The National Lottery - £9,984

The Peter John Foord Foundation - £10,000

The Foundation usually has a successful Christmas period, attending events across the region. Sadly, every single one of these events was also cancelled, which resulted in a huge reduction in the retail income the Foundation usually generates from the sale of Christmas decorations. With a huge effort and support from This Is Fever the online Christmas Shop was created. This offset some of the lost revenue but still only made circa 50% of the revenue of prior years. It was better than nothing!

As always fundraisers find ways to support us. A head shave by the Chairman, to remove the lockdown locks raised some £3,755, with the cancellation of the London Marathon our runners did a virtual run instead.

The Alma Public House raised over £1,000 by selling bread, £110 was raised from a VE Day Tea Party, Colchester Forum Rotary club donated £1,700 after a fundraising event was cancelled and the annual Pumpkin Hunt around West Bergholt still managed to raise an amazing £974! All these and more meant that we could still provide the support that was so desperately needed.

### Corporate Support

Every year, one of the main targets Trustees have set the Foundation and themselves is to enhance and increase the level of corporate support it receives.

Corporate support can have a huge impact on the funds we have available and when a company engages with the Foundation, they can know that they are making a huge difference and potentially have more impact on the Foundation than they would on a larger charity.

With the onset of the Pandemic and Lockdown, this support was all the more important and I am delighted to say that our main partner, SCOR, stepped up to the plate and made some huge donations to assist us. At the beginning of Lockdown they immediately brought forward the target for the year and gave donations of £40,000 across the year and then a further £18,000 from staff donating Christmas Shopping vouchers

- Rund Partnership continues to provide regular donations and gave a one off donation of £1,000
- Nationwide Building Society gave £20,000 to support grant applications from young people who are struggling to keep a roof over their heads.
- Linklaters Covid-19 Fund gave us £2,000.
- W Denis Insurance Brokers donated £1,311.
- RSA Insurance Company, who have always been generous supporters, gave us £5,000.

### Summary

After an incredibly tough year we should celebrate our successes but not become complacent but be glad the Foundation is still operating.
